<p>The 2010 Oxford Global Leadership Programme will offer GSP students the opportunity to explore the most urgent challenges and opportunities for humanity in the 21st century.</p> <p>Students will have tutorials and seminars with research faculty and staff from the Oxford University James Martin 21st Century School. This is a unique collaborative research institution which seeks to develop strategies for responding to the most serious problems and most promising opportunities for the world in the twenty-first century. The School currently comprises fifteen research institutes, focusing on such topics as bioethics, nanotechnology, pandemics, ageing, climate change, and stem cell science, among others. Contributions from five institutes are expected, and are likely to include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Institute for Emerging Infections ○ Environmental Change Institute ○ Future of Humanity Institute ○ Stem Cell Institute <p>In groups of three or four, the GSP students will prepare a project for presentation in the final week. Topics for the projects are likely to include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Globalisation and economic growth vs environmentalism: are they really incompatible? ○ Information Technology and the Web: forces for social cohesion, or social exclusion? ○ National Security: does globalisation promote or erode it? ○ Land and water use: what do global trends mean for the coming century? <p>Students will also attend lectures offered through the Oxford University Summer School in History Politics and Society (HPS). They will also take an HPS course on political and social aspects of the contemporary world, choosing one from the following three topics.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Post Communist Europe: Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union since 1989 ○ The European Union in Perspective ○ Globalisation – Evolution or Revolution?

Delivery method/course structure and contact hours

Seminars – 5 sessions led by researchers from the James Martin 21st Century School @ 1.5 hrs = **7.5 hrs**

Tutorials – 3 sessions in pairs or threes, for which each student prepares a 1,500-word essay, discusses the content with the tutor and co-tutees, and submits the essay for marking and return by the tutor.

3 tutorials @ 1 hr = **3.0 hrs**

Project - preparation in small groups with guidance from the tutor. Presentations of all the group’s projects – minimum of 5 @ 45 mins = **3.75 hrs**

HPS Course – 6 taught sessions for a group of usually 8 – 12 participants. Students read in preparation for each class meeting and prepare a 2,000-word essay for submission in the third week.

6 classes @ 2 hrs – **12 hrs**

HPS Lectures – Lectures are given by specialists drawn both from Oxford University and more widely; each lecture is followed by the opportunity for questions from the audience. These are given Monday – Friday of Weeks 1 - 3. 15 lecture sessions @ 1.5 hrs = **22.5 hrs**
