Australian National University



Professor Brian P. SCHMIDT
Vice-Chancellor and President

Professor Brian P. Schmidt was appointed Vice-Chancellor of ANU in January 2016.

Professor Schmidt is the 12th Vice-Chancellor of The Australian National University (ANU). Winner of the 2011 Nobel Prize in Physics, Professor Schmidt was an astrophysicist at the ANU Mount Stromlo Observatory and Research School of Astronomy and Astrophysics before becoming Vice-Chancellor. Professor Schmidt received undergraduate degrees in Astronomy and Physics from the University of Arizona in 1989, and completed his Astronomy Master's degree (1992) and PhD (1993) from Harvard University. Under his leadership, in 1998, the High-Z Supernova Search team made the startling discovery that the expansion rate of the Universe is accelerating. Fellow of the Australian Academy of Science, The United States Academy of Science, and the Royal Society, he was made a Companion of the Order of Australia in 2013.

Professor Margaret HARDING
Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Research



Professor Margaret Harding was appointed Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Research) at the Australian National University in June 2012. She is responsible for the development and implementation of strategies, policies and systems to maintain and enhance achievements and overall research performance of the ANU. She is a Director on the Boards of ANU Enterprise, Australian Scientific Instruments, an alternate Director on the Board of ANU Connect Ventures, and a member of the Governing Boards of the National Computational Infrastructure and the National Centre for Indigenous Genomics. She is Chair of the Australian Giant Magellan Telescope Committee and Chair of the Group of Eight Deputy Vice-Chancellors (Research) Committee.

Professor Harding held the positions of Pro Vice-Chancellor (Research) at the University of New South Wales (UNSW) from 2008-2012, and inaugural Dean of Graduate Research at UNSW from 2005-2009. She has been a director on the Boards of the UNSW Foundation, Neuroscience Research Australia, an alternate Director on the Board of Bionic Vision Australia, and was a member of the 2011 NSW State Government Review of Health and Medical Research Panel and of the Australian Research Council Advisory Council from 2011-2012.

Professor Harding holds PhD (1987) and DSc (2002) degrees from the University of Sydney. She held postdoctoral positions at the Université Louis Pasteur in Strasbourg, France and the University of Cambridge, before returning to Australia and an academic position at the University of Sydney.

Professor Harding's current research interests are in biological and medicinal chemistry with a particular focus on antifreeze proteins and molecular recognition of DNA. She has published over 110 research articles, been awarded the Royal Australian Chemical Institute Rennie and Biota Medals, and held Australian Academy of Science Fellowships in France, UK and USA. She has served on many committees in the Australian Research Council (ARC) and has been a member of the Editorial Boards of Medicinal Chemistry and MiniReviews in Medicinal Chemistry.



Professor Shirley LEITCH
Pro Vice-Chancellor (International and Outreach)

Professor Shirley Leitch has been Dean of the College of Business and Economics at The Australian National University since 2014. From November 2015, she was also appointed as Pro Vice-Chancellor (International and Outreach). Previously, she was Deputy Vice Chancellor (Academic) at Swinburne University of Technology in Melbourne, Australia, where she co-founded Online Education Services Ltd (OES) in partnership with SEEK Ltd. In 2015, OES was recognised as Australia's fastest growing company in the BRW Fast 100.

ETH Zurich



Professor Dr. Lino GUZZELLA
President

Lino Guzzella has been full professor of thermotronics since 1999 and, in addition, from August 2012 to December 2014 Rector of ETH Zurich. Since January 2015 he is President of ETH Zurich.

He was born on October 13, 1957 in Zurich. After receiving his mechanical engineering diploma in 1981 and his doctoral degree in 1986 from ETH, he held several positions in industry (R&D team leader, Sulzer Brothers, Winterthur; R&D mechatronics department head, Hilti, Schaan) and academia (assistant and associate professor in the electrical engineering and mechanical engineering department at ETH; Honda Visiting Professor at The Ohio State University).

With his group he focuses in research on novel approaches in system dynamics and control of energy conversion systems. Control-oriented systems modeling, dynamic optimization and feedback control design methods are the main area of research. A particular emphasis is placed on the minimization of fuel consumption and pollutant emission of land vehicle propulsion systems. Among others he received the IEEE-MSC – Industry Award for Excellence in Translational Control Research, IEEE Control Systems Magazine Outstanding Paper Award, the SAE Arch T. Colwell Merit Award and the Ralph R. Teeter Educational Award, the IMechE Thomas Hawksley Medal and Crompton Lancaster Medal, the Energy Globe Award and the Golden Owl 2011 for Excellence in Teaching.

Professor Guzzella has published more than 100 research articles in peer refereed journals and conferences as well as two research textbooks (Introduction to Modeling and Control of IC Engine Systems, Springer Verlag, 2nd. Ed. 2010 and Vehicle Propulsion Systems – Modeling and Optimization, Springer Verlag, 3rd Ed. 2013). He has been a keynote speaker at many conferences worldwide.

Professor Guzzella is a fellow of IFAC and a fellow of IEEE and a member of the Swiss academy of engineering sciences (SATW). He is member of several international and national research committees, e.g. the Swiss CTI Committee on Engineering Sciences and was for many years member of the board of governors of IFAC.



Dr. Jürg BRUNNSCHWEILER

Director Global Institutional Affairs, ETH Global

Dr. Jürg Brunnschweiler obtained his doctorate in Biology from the University of Zurich. He joined ETH Zurich in 2002, working first in the Presidents' Staff and the Lecturers' Office, then in the office dealing with the European Union Framework Programmes. In 2009, he returned to the Office for Faculty Affairs where he was responsible for faculty recruiting procedures at various departments. In addition, he was contact person for academic career advancement and Secretary of the Tenure Committee. Since 1 October 2012, Dr. Brunnschweiler is the Head of ETH Global and Director of Global Institutional Affairs at ETH Zurich.

National University of Singapore



Professor Tan CHORH CHUAN

President

Professor Tan Chorh Chuan is the President of NUS. He concurrently serves as the Chairman of the Board of the National University Health System. Prof Tan's additional appointments include Deputy Chairman of Singapore's Agency for Science, Technology and Research (A*STAR); Senior Advisor to the Governing Board of Duke-NUS Graduate Medical School; Member, Board of Directors of the Monetary Authority of Singapore; and Member, Board of Directors of Mandai Safari Park Holdings.

NUS President Professor Tan Chorh Chuan was the IARU chairperson from 2009 to 2012.



Professor Andrew WEE

Vice President, University and Global Relations

Professor Andrew Wee is Vice President (University and Global Relations) at the National University of Singapore. In his role as Vice President, he works with the President on the University's efforts to become a leading global university located in the heart of Asia through the strengthening of strategic relations with stakeholders both in Singapore and overseas.

Prof Wee, who was Dean of the NUS Faculty of Science from April 2007 to March 2014, is President of the Singapore National Academy of Science. He is also the Director of the Surface Science Laboratory in the Department of Physics at the NUS Faculty of Science, and an adjunct scientist at the Agency of Science, Technology and Research's Institute of Materials Research and Engineering.

A Professor of Physics, Prof Wee was awarded the President's medal in 2008 by the Institute of Physics, Singapore, as well as a UK-Singapore Partners in Science Collaboration Award in 2006 as a visiting scientist to Imperial College. Prof Wee was previously a visiting scientist with the Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratories in the US, a Commonwealth Fellow as well as a Rhodes Scholar at the University of Oxford. He holds a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) in Physics as well as a Master's degree from the University of Cambridge. He received his DPhil from the University of Oxford.

Peking University



Professor LIN Jianhua

President

LIN Jianhua is President of Peking University and Professor of Chemistry. His presidential term began in February 2015.

Prior to becoming President of Peking University, Professor Lin served as President of Chongqing University from December 2010 to June 2013, and President of Zhejiang University from 2013 to 2015. Other leadership roles have included: Dean of the College of Chemistry, Executive Vice President and

Provost at Peking University from 1998 to 2010.

Born in October 1955 in Inner Mongolia, China, Professor Lin received his PhD in Chemistry from Peking University in 1986 and joined the University as an academic faculty in the same year. From 1988 to 1993, he conducted his post-doctoral research in the field of inorganic solid chemistry and material chemistry first at Max-Planck Institute of Solid State Research in Germany and then at the Department of Chemistry at Iowa State University and Ames National Laboratory in the US. In 1993, Professor Lin returned to teach at Peking University as an Associate Professor and was promoted to full professorship in 1995.

Professor Lin's research interests cover a wide range of areas in solid chemistry, with more focus on new metal borates with novel structure type, and synthesis, structure and properties of transition metal oxides. He has published over 140 journal articles on the related subjects.

In addition to teaching and mentoring scores of students, Professor Lin won the 1st Prize for State-level Teaching Excellence in 2009. He was also awarded the 2nd Prize for Science and Technology Excellence by the Ministry of Education in 1995 and a recipient of National Outstanding Youth Foundation in 1997.



Professor LI Chenjian

Vice-Provost and Professor and Associate Dean of School of Life Science

Dr. Li attended Peking University for his undergraduate education, and Peking Union Medical College for training in medicine. He received his Ph.D in Molecular Genetics from Purdue University, USA; postdoctoral training at the Rockefeller University. Dr. Li was an assistant professor and associate professor at Weill Medical College of Cornell University, and then Aidekman Endowed Chair at Mount Sinai School of Medicine of NYU. Dr. Li returned to Peking University in 2013.

Dr. Li's scientific research focuses on exploring the molecular and cellular basis of higher brain functions, and the mechanisms of neurological diseases. His laboratory pioneered transgenic methods and some of the animal models that are commonly used by academic labs and pharmaceutical industry in neurodegeneration field. These animal models are powerful tools for mechanistic studies as well as drug discoveries. For his leading role in this line of research, Dr. Li received C.H. Lee Scholar Award and National Service Award (USA). He is a standing member of the National Institute of Health Study Section for Neurological Diseases, USA.



Professor CHEN Dongmin

Director, Office of Science and Technology Development

Dr. Chen Dongmin is a Professor in School for Advanced Interdisciplinary Studies of Peking University and he spearheads IARU's Academic IP Pooling and Collaborative Technology Transfer initiative.

Prior to joining Peking University, he was an adjunct Professor of the Institute of Physics, Chinese Academy of Sciences where he served as the co-director of the Beijing National Laboratory for Condensed Matter Physics from 2004 to 2009. Before that he was a Sr. Rowland Fellow and the Head of the Nanoscale Quantum Physics Lab. of Rowland Institute at Harvard University where he worked from 1989 to 2004. His academic expertise includes nonvolatile material and device physics, MEMS device and process, MEMS-CMOS integration; spin and quantum device physics.


Dr. Chen is an Associate Editor of Applied Physics letter; a Sr. Associate Editor of Chinese Science Bulletin and an Associate Editor of Chinese Physics Letter. Dr. Chen co-founded Miradia Inc. in Silicon Valley in 2003 where he led the development of a platform technology for MEMS-CMOS 3D integration for applications in digital micro-mirror array and motion sensors, and successfully licensed the technology to TSMC. Dr. Chen is a Board of Director and served as its 2010–2011 President of the Chinese American Semiconductor Professional Association (CASPA).



Professor ZHENG Xiaoying
Director, Institute of Population Research

Dr. Zheng is professor and director of Institute of Population Research/WHO Collaborating Center for Reproductive Health and Population Science at Peking University, and dean of PKU-APEC Health Science Academy. She has been appointed as Special Professor of the Changjiang Scholar Incentive Program, Chief Scientist of the National Program on Key Basic Research Project (973 Program) for twice, and Group Leader of National Disability Prevention Action Plan Experts Group. She has worked at London University, Harvard University, John Hopkins University, etc. as a postdoctoral fellow or visiting professor.

Dr. Zheng is currently the Board Member of Life Science Innovation Forum (LSIF) of APEC, Chinese Representative for Washington Group on Disability of UN, Vice President of China Disability Research Society, and Vice President of China Healthy Birth Science Association, etc. Dr. Zheng was awarded the TWAS-Celso Furtado Prize in Social Sciences in 2015.



Professor ZHANG Xudong
Chong Keung Chair Professor of Chinese & Comparative Literature;
Director, International Center for Critical Theory

Dr. Zhang Xudong is currently the Chong Keung Chair Professor in the Department of Chinese Language & Literature of Peking University, and Director of PKU International Center for Critical Theory (ICCT), a research consortium with member or affiliating centers in New York, Shanghai, Tokyo, and Beijing.

Dr. Zhang attended Peking University for his undergraduate education. He received his PhD from the Graduate Program in Literature of Duke University, USA. Dr. Zhang taught at Rutgers University before joining NYU, first as a Rockefeller Fellow in the Humanities, then as an Assistant Professor of Comparative Literature and Chinese. In 2005, he became Professor of Comparative Literature and Professor of East Asian Studies at New York University, and went on to chairing the Department of East Asian Studies from 2006 to 2012. Since 2008, Dr. Zhang has held the recurring visiting Chong Keung Chair in the Department of Chinese Language and Literature at Peking University.

Dr. Zhang's research focuses on literary and cultural theory; modern Chinese literature and thought; and political philosophy. His teaching and publication, in both English and Chinese, revolve around questions concerning critical theory and its reformulation in international, particularly non-Western, context; cultural identity in the age of globalization; the modernism-postmodernism debate; methodologies for critical area studies and comparison; and critical interpretation of classical and foundational texts for building the core curriculum of liberal education.



Dr. XIA Hongwei

Director, Office of International Relations

Dr Xia Hongwei is Director of the Office of International Relations of Peking University and Deputy Director of the Peking University Center for International Higher Education. He received his Bachelor degree in Political Science from the University of International Relations in 1989, and went on to further his postgraduate studies at Peking University and was awarded the Master and Ph.D in International & Intercultural Studies in 1994 and 2009 respectively.

From 1995 to 1997, Dr Xia was invited as an exchange scholar in the Department of Communication Studies, University of Nebraska-Lincoln, United States, engaging in the study of cross-cultural communication. In June 2005, he was again invited as a visiting scholar sponsored by DAAD to conduct research on the China-Germany Educational Exchange in the late 19th century at the Free University of Berlin. In the summer of 2007, Dr Xia visited the Fairbank Center for Chinese Studies at Harvard University as a visiting fellow focusing on the research of cultural interactions between China and US in early 20th century.

Dr Xia has published several theses in academic journals about Sino-Foreign Higher Education Exchange, and edited books on the Internationalization of Universities, and conducted some research projects on Student Mobility of China's National Association of Research on Study Abroad. His main research areas include: Sino-Western Cultural Exchange in late Qing Dynasty, Cross-cultural Conflict and Communication, Internationalization of Higher Education and International Communication and Management between Universities.



Dr. ZHENG Ruqing

Deputy Director, Office of International Relations

Dr. Zheng received her Bachelor of Material Science and Master of Polymer Science from Fudan University, Shanghai in 1990 and 1993, respectively. She then studied at US and received the Ph.D. in Polymer Science in 2000 at the University of Akron, Ohio. She was a polymer scientist with extensive research experience of structure characterization, especially in the field of liquid crystalline polymers.

Dr. Zheng joined Office of International Relations at Peking University since September, 2000. She has served first as Senior Program Officer, thereafter as Assistant Director (2004), and Deputy Director (2008). She has been responsible for European affairs, international research collaboration, and Education Abroad Programs, with all at the University level. Dr. Zheng has now also in charge of regional affairs for Northeast and middle Asia since late 2014.

Dr. Zheng has published a number of scientific papers, and papers on higher education and research collaboration.




Ms. LI Yun

Dr. Nicholas B. DIRKS

Chancellor

Nicholas B. Dirks is Chancellor of the University of California, Berkeley. Prior to Berkeley, he served as Executive Vice President and Dean of the Faculty at Columbia University, where, in addition to his work on behalf of undergraduate programs, he improved and diversified the faculty, putting special emphasis on interdisciplinary and international initiatives. He also served as chair of the anthropology department at Columbia.

Prior to his appointment at Columbia, he was a professor of history and anthropology at the University of Michigan. He is the author of several books on South Asian history and culture and the impact of British colonial rule, including *The Hollow Crown: Ethnohistory of an Indian Kingdom*, *Castes of Mind*, and *Scandal of Empire*. He published a new volume of essays on a wide range of topics in his 2015 *Autobiography of an Archive*.

His current projects concern the last years of British rule in India and the growing role of the United States in South Asia, as well as the global and technological environment for higher education in the century ahead. He was elected a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2014.



Professor Pradeep CHHIBBER
Director, Institute of International Studies

Professor Pradeep Chhibber is the Director of the Institute of International Studies at UC Berkeley. He is concurrently the Indo-American Endowed Chair and Class of 1959 Chair as well as a professor at the Department of Political Science at UC Berkeley. Professor Chhibber has published extensively on issues related to party systems, electoral politics and the politics of India.

Sir Leszek BORYSIEWICZ
Vice-Chancellor

Sir Leszek Borysiewicz is the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Cambridge. His previous appointments include Chief Executive of the Medical Research Council – the main funding body for medical academics in the UK – Deputy Rector of Imperial College, Governor of the Wellcome Trust and founding Fellow of the Academy of Medical Sciences. For his services to medical research in the UK, and in particular for his development of a vaccine to reduce the risk of cervical cancer, Sir Leszek was knighted in the 2001 New Year's Honours List. He is an outstanding scholar and a highly respected leader with an impressive record of excellence.



Professor Eilís FERRAN
Pro-Vice-Chancellor for Institutional and International Relations

Professor Eilís Ferran is the Pro-Vice-Chancellor for Institutional and International Relations, responsible for the University's human resources policy and strategy as well as oversight and development of the University's international engagement. She is also Professor of Company and Securities Law in the Faculty of Law, a University JM Keynes Fellow in Financial Economics and a Professorial Fellow at St Catharine's College. She served as Chair of the Faculty of Law from 2012 to 2015. Her main research interests are corporate finance law, financial regulation and general company law.



Dr Toby WILKINSON
Director of International Strategy

As Director of International Strategy and Head of the International Strategy Office, Dr Wilkinson works closely with the Vice-Chancellor, Pro-Vice-Chancellors and academic leadership to develop and implement the University's global engagement, with a particular focus on research collaborations with partners in Asia, Africa, Europe and the Americas.

Dr Wilkinson is also an internationally renowned expert on ancient Egypt, a prize-winning author, and one of the leading Egyptologists of his generation. He is a Fellow of Clare College, Cambridge.

University of Cape Town



Dr Max PRICE
Vice-Chancellor

Dr Max Price took up the post of Vice-Chancellor of the University of Cape Town in July 2008. Before that he was Dean of the Faculty of Health Sciences at the University of the Witwatersrand (Wits). He has degrees from the universities of the Witwatersrand (Medicine), Oxford (BA), and London (Public Health).

From 1996 to 2006, as Dean at Wits, he spearheaded the introduction of a new medical curriculum, led the transformation of the faculty, initiated a variety of courses and programmes and established the first university-owned private teaching hospital and also a major clinical research company.

After obtaining his medical degree from Wits, Dr Price was awarded a Rhodes Scholarship. He studied Philosophy, Politics and Economics at Oxford. Following clinical work in academic and rural hospitals in SA, he took a master's degree at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, continuing there as a Research Fellow in Health Economics. He joined the Centre for Health Policy at Wits in 1988 as a Senior Researcher, and become its Director in 1992.

Dr Price's research has covered the political economy of health in South Africa, health economics, rural health services, health systems research and health science education. He served on the Medical and Dental Professions Board from 2000-2010, chairing the committee responsible for accreditation of medical programmes in South Africa.

He is an Honorary Fellow of the Colleges of Medicine of South Africa in recognition of his leadership role in public health medicine and medical education.

Dr Price is currently Chair of Worldwide Universities Network, Chair of the African Research Universities Alliance, and Vice-Chair of Universities South Africa.



Dr Marilet SIENAERT
Executive Director, Research

Dr. Marilet Sienaert is responsible for grants management; benchmarking and reporting; evaluation and monitoring of units, centres and institutes; research internationalization; brokering of partnerships; and delivering a comprehensive framework of support for the research development of current and future academic staff. Her management remit for executing this portfolio spans the Research Office, the Office of Research Integrity, the Director of Postgraduate Studies & Researcher Development, and the Postgraduate Centre & Funding Office. At the strategic level, she works closely with the cluster of research committees and supports the Deputy Vice Chancellor for research, to meet challenges and seize opportunities in the evolving research and policy environments at national and global level.

An active member of the South African Research & Innovation Management Association (SARIMA) and the International Organisation for Research Management Societies (INORMS), Sienaert has delivered many papers at national and international conferences on research management. She has also served as panel member on the South African Council for Higher Education's national quality assurance audits of universities and on reference groups of the National Research Foundation.

Sienaert holds a PhD in Literary Studies from the University of Natal, and prior to moving into her research management career was a professor in the Department of Modern Languages at Durban-Westville University.



Dr Russell ALLY
Executive Director, Development & Alumni Department

Dr Ally was appointed Executive Director of the Development and Alumni Department (DAD) from 1 August 2013.

He has worked for the past five years at the Ford Foundation, an endowed, non-profit grant-making foundation based in New York. As Ford's programme officer for Southern Africa, Dr Ally oversaw the Governance and Civil Society Programme in South Africa, Mozambique, Namibia and Zimbabwe.

A UCT alumnus, Dr Ally started his career as a history teacher at the John Bisseker Senior Secondary School in East London. He obtained his Masters at Rhodes University and a Doctorate from Cambridge University, both in History. He then worked as a senior history researcher at the University of the Witwatersrand where he served on Senate and Council and was founding chairperson of the Academic Staff Association.

Before joining the Ford Foundation Dr Ally was the Country Representative and Executive Director of the Charles Stewart Mott Foundation in South Africa and worked for the United Nations Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights. Earlier, Dr Ally served on the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Human Rights Violation Committee, chaired by Archbishop Emeritus Desmond Tutu.

As the Executive Director, Dr Ally is responsible for the formulation, implementation and monitoring of all strategic and operational activities regarding UCT's development and fundraising endeavours. These include strengthening donor and alumni relations, developing fundraising and capital campaigns and bequest programmes and tapping into philanthropic and corporate social investment goals of foundations and corporate in Africa and abroad. DAD is tasked with ensuring that fundraising

strategies yield adequate resources to achieve the university's mission at a time when higher education funding streams face significant risks.

University of Copenhagen



Professor Ralf HEMMINGSEN

Rector, Chairman of IARU

Professor Dr. Ralf Hemmingsen has served as the Rector of UCPH since 2005. He had served three years as Dean of the Faculty of Health Sciences before his current appointment and was awarded the University of Copenhagen Gold Medal. Professor Hemmingsen's prior appointments included key positions in the medical sector such as the Medical Director of the Psychiatric Department at Bispebjerg Hospital in Copenhagen and the Deputy Chairman of the Association of Junior Doctors. He is well-respected as an educator and a researcher in the fields of neurobiology and psychiatry.



Professor Thomas BJØRNHOLM

Prorector for Research and Innovation

Professor Thomas Bjørnholm is Prorector for Research and Innovation at the University of Copenhagen since 2010. Thomas Bjørnholm was Director of Nano-Science Center at the University of Copenhagen from 2001. He obtained his PhD in materials chemistry in 1990. In 1992, he became affiliated with the Chemistry Department at the University of Copenhagen as Associate Professor, in 2000 as Research Professor and in 2005 as full Professor. Thomas Bjørnholm has published more than 200 papers in scientific journals and books including several contributions to high impact journals as Science and Nature.



Dr. Lykke FRIIS

Prorector for Education

Ms. Lykke Friis is Prorector for Education since August 2013. Ms. Friis has once before been Prorector at the University of Copenhagen and held the position from 2006 until she was appointed Minister of Climate and Energy in November 2009–2011 and from 2010 also Minister for Gender Equality. She was member of the Danish Parliament from 2011–2013. Widely recognised as one of the world's foremost experts on terrorism and counter-terrorism, her book *What Terrorists Want*, is widely accepted as one of the most influential in the field.

Loren Griffith is Director of the University of Oxford's International Strategy team, which works to develop a coherent corporate strategy to promote Oxford's international relations, global profile and international competitiveness.

The team's portfolio includes issues such as international student recruitment and funding, international research and education collaborations and promoting deeper engagement with key countries/regions.

Prior to joining Oxford, Loren was a management consultant at McKinsey & Company for seven years, serving clients in health care and secondary and higher education. He also worked for United States President Barack Obama's transition team and for the California State Senate. Dr. Makoto GONOKAMI
President

Professor Makoto Gonokami became the 30th President of the University of Tokyo on April 1st, 2015, with a six-year term. Prof. Gonokami was previously the Dean of the School of Science. He became a full professor in 1998 having joined UTokyo as an academic staff in 1983. He has held several appointments in UTokyo including the positions of Vice President ('12-'14). He is a council member of the Science Council of Japan, and a Fellow of the American Physical Society (2012) and Optical Society of America (2013). Professor Gonokami is well-known in the field of photon science, and has established worldleading photon research centers in the School of Science and School of Engineering.



Prof. Kiichi FUJIWARA
Special Assistant to the President, Professor, Graduate Schools of Law and Politics

Professor Kiichi Fujiwara is Professor of International Politics at the University of Tokyo, teaching courses on international relations and international conflict at the Faculty of Law, Graduate Schools of Law and Politics, and the Graduate School of Public Policy, the University of Tokyo.

A graduate of the University of Tokyo (B.A. and M.A.), Professor Fujiwara studied as a Fulbright student at Yale University before he returned to Japan at the Institute of Social Science (ISS). He first joined the faculty at Chiba University and then returned to ISS for seven years before moving into his present position. He has held positions at the University of the Philippines, Johns Hopkins University, and was selected as a fellow of the Woodrow Wilson International Center at Washington D.C.

Professor Fujiwara is known for his writings on international affairs, including *Remembering the War* (2001), *A Democratic Empire* (2002), *Is There Really a Just War?* (2003), *Peace for Realists* (2004) (winner of the Ishibashi Tanzan award, 2005), *International Politics* (2007), *War Unleashed* (2007), and *Conditions of War* (2013). Professor Fujiwara is a regular commentator on international affairs and Japanese foreign policy on Japanese TV networks such as NHK and TBS, along with the BBC World Service, CNN and NPR. He is also a film critic with two published works, *America in Film* (2006) and *That's a Movie!* (2012).



Mr. Tatsuya KUWAHARA

Mr. Tatsuya Kuwahara has been Manager of the International Planning Group at the University of Tokyo since April 2014.

Yale University



Professor Peter SALOVEY

President

Peter Salovey is the 23rd president of Yale University, and the Chris Argyris Professor of Psychology. His presidential term began in July 2013.

Prior to becoming president, he served as the provost of Yale University from 2008 to 2013. As provost, he facilitated strategic planning and initiatives such as: enhancing career development and mentoring opportunities for all Yale faculty members; promoting faculty diversity; creating the Office of Academic Integrity; establishing the University-wide Committee on Sexual Misconduct; developing the West Campus; and overseeing the University's budget during the global financial crisis. His other leadership roles at Yale have included: chair of the Department of Psychology from 2000 to 2003; dean of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences in 2003 and 2004; and dean of Yale College from 2004 to 2008.

After receiving an A.B. (psychology) and A.M. (sociology) from Stanford University in 1980 with departmental honors and university distinction, President Salovey earned three degrees at Yale in psychology: an M.S. (1983), M.Phil. (1984), and Ph.D. (1986). Since joining the Yale faculty in 1986, he has studied the connection between human emotion and health behavior, and played key roles in multiple Yale programs including: the Health, Emotion, and Behavior Laboratory, which President Salovey founded and is now called the Center for Emotional Intelligence; the Center for Interdisciplinary Research on AIDS; and the Cancer Prevention and Control Research Program. He currently holds secondary faculty appointments in the Schools of Management and Public Health, the Institution for Social and Policy Studies, and the Sociology Department.

President Salovey has authored or edited over a dozen books translated into eleven languages and published hundreds of journal articles and essays, focused primarily on human emotion and health behavior. With John D. Mayer, he developed a broad framework called "Emotional Intelligence," the theory that just as people have a wide range of intellectual abilities, they also have a wide range of measurable emotional skills that profoundly affect their thinking and action.

In addition to teaching and mentoring scores of graduate students, President Salovey has won both the William Clyde DeVane Medal for Distinguished Scholarship and Teaching in Yale College and the Lex Hixon '63 Prize for Teaching Excellence in the Social Sciences. He has received honorary degrees from the University of Pretoria (2009), Shanghai Jiao Tong University (2014), National Tsing Hua University (2014), and Harvard University (2015). He was elected to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and to the Institute of Medicine of the National Academies in 2013.



Mr. Donald L. FILER

Executive Director, Office of International Affairs

Donald Filer was appointed to his present position in 2004 as the first director of Yale's newly created Office of International Affairs (OIA). He has overall responsibility for OIA, providing administrative support for the international activities of the schools, programs, and individual faculty across the university. These efforts focus on supporting the development of new projects with partner universities, coordinating the work of other Yale offices during project start-ups, managing visits to Yale by university delegations and other dignitaries, and safeguarding Yale's reputation around the world.

Mr. Filer also leads the university's emergency response in the event of a medical emergency, natural disaster, or civil unrest taking place abroad, and oversees the Yale Young Global Scholars Program, the Greenberg Conference Center, the Office of International Students and Scholars, and the Yale Conferences & Events Office.

He joined Yale University in 2000 as Associate Secretary with responsibility for managing support for the Yale Corporation (the university's governing board), supervising the Yale Visitor Center, and directing the Office of Licensing Programs. Prior to his appointment at Yale, he served in a number of capacities at Connecticut College in New London, Connecticut, from 1991 to 2000 including Vice President for Community and Public Affairs, Secretary of the College, and Acting Vice President for Development. He worked for former U.S. Representative Bruce A. Morrison of New Haven from 1985 to 1991. Mr. Filer earned a B.A. in political science from Colgate University.

Professor Ngaire WOODS

Dean of the Blavatnik School of Government and Professor of Global Economic Governance, University of Oxford

Professor Ngaire Woods is the inaugural Dean of the Blavatnik School of Government and Professor of International Political Economy. Her research focuses on global economic governance, the challenges of globalization, global development, and the role of international institutions. She founded and is the Director of the Global Economic Governance Programme. She is co-founder (with Robert O. Keohane) of the Oxford-Princeton Global Leaders Fellowship programme. She led the creation of the Blavatnik School of Government at Oxford University and, before her appointment as Dean, served as the School's Academic Director.

Her recent books include *The Politics of Global Regulation* (with Walter Mattli, Oxford University Press, 2009), *Networks of Influence? Developing Countries in a Networked Global Order* (with Leonardo Martinez-Diaz, Oxford University Press, 2009), *The Globalizers: the IMF, the World Bank and their Borrowers* (Cornell University Press, 2006), *Exporting Good Governance: Temptations and Challenges in Canada's Aid Program* (with Jennifer Welsh, Laurier University Press, 2007), and *Making Self-Regulation Effective in Developing Countries* (with Dana Brown, Oxford University Press, 2007). She has previously published *The Political Economy of Globalization* (Macmillan, 2000), *Inequality, Globalization and World Politics* (with Andrew Hurrell: Oxford University Press, 1999), *Explaining International Relations since 1945* (Oxford University Press, 1986), and numerous articles on international institutions, globalization, and governance.

Ngaire Woods was educated at Auckland University (BA in economics, LLB Hons in law). She studied at Balliol College, Oxford as a New Zealand Rhodes Scholar, completing an M.Phil in International Relations (with Distinction) and D.Phil. She won a Junior Research Fellowship at New College, Oxford (1990-1992) and subsequently taught at Harvard University (Government Department) before taking up her Fellowship at University College, Oxford.

Ngaire Woods has served as an Advisor to the IMF Board, to the UNDP's Human Development Report, and to the Commonwealth Heads of Government. She was a regular presenter of the Analysis Program for BBC Radio 4, and in 1998 presented her own BBC TV series on public policy. She has also served as a member of the IMF European Regional Advisory Group, and Chair of a World Economic Forum's Global Agenda Council. She is currently a Rhodes Trustee, a Non-Executive Director of Arup, a member of the Advisory Group of the Center for Global Development (Washington DC), a member of the Board of the Center for International Governance Innovation (Waterloo), a member of the Academic and Policy Board of Oxonia, and a Trustee of the Europeum.



Professor Angus HAWKINS

Acting Director, Department for Continuing Education, University of Oxford

Professor Angus Hawkins' academic interests focus on British political culture during the 19th and 20th centuries. This includes views of the constitution, party systems, electoral behaviour and the changing language of political debate in parliament, the constituencies and 'popular' campaigns. The period is one of rich and fascinating developments in all these aspects of political culture, which are closely associated with the broader religious, intellectual, social and economic dynamics of the age. Hawkins' forthcoming book *'Habits of Heart and Mind': Victorian Political Culture* discusses British political culture from the late-18th to the early-20th century and how it sits within public values shaping the understanding of community, the past and morality. Hawkins' recent publications include the two-volume biography of the 14th Earl of Derby entitled *The Forgotten Prime Minister* (Oxford, 2007-8).



Mr. Keith ZIMMERMAN

University Secretary, The Open University, UK

The University Secretary is responsible for the effective governance of the University and for ensuring that the Professional Services are effectively and efficiently managed to meet University objectives. This entails membership of the Vice-Chancellor's Executive, acting as secretary of Council and Senate, overseeing the work of the OU in the devolved nations of the UK, and the management of units responsible for: strategic and resource planning, student and associate lecturer support services, academic policy and quality assurance processes, and central administrative services including Finance, Estates, Human Resources, and Information Technology.

Dr Rebecca SURENDER

Pro-Vice Chancellor for Diversity

Dr Rebecca Surender is Head of Department for Social Policy and Intervention and a Fellow of Green Templeton College. Her research, teaching and publications are primarily in the area of health policy and social policy in developing countries. She was a founding member and Director of the Centre for the Analysis of South African Social Policy (CASASP) at Oxford University, the first UK academic centre to undertake research exclusively on South African social policy. Her main focus within South African social policy concerns the politics,

implementation and outcomes of health and income maintenance policies. She has led a number of CASASP studies researching the implementation of the Child Support Grant, the effectiveness of Income Generation Projects, and the attitudes of benefit recipients to labour activation strategies and social grants. She has worked as a consultant and advisor for various multilateral and government agencies including the World Bank, UNRISD, UK DFID and SA DSD.

She is currently a Visiting Professor at the Institute of Social and Economic Research (ISER) at Rhodes University, South Africa, where she is leading a three year collaborative project examining the implementation, policy dynamics and effects of the proposed new National Health Insurance (NHI) reforms.

Dr Surender has held a number of senior administrative positions within the Department, Green Templeton College and the wider University. She was elected a University Proctor for 2013-14 and was appointed a Pro Vice-Chancellor and University Advocate for Diversity in 2015. The post is designed to provide strategic direction and coordination to the various equality and diversity initiatives currently taking place throughout the university.



Ms. Trudy COE

Head of Equality & Diversity, University of Oxford

Trudy Coe became Head of Equality and Diversity at the University of Oxford in June 2011. Her particular interest is in exploring and addressing the cultural barriers to the progression of women into senior leadership and academic roles.

Trudy has worked for the University since 2003, including as Head of Professional Development. Her previous career was in policy and research work in higher education, as Director of an evaluation company, and in management and leadership, as Head of Policy for the UK Chartered Management Institute. In 2002, she undertook a review for the Royal Society of Chemistry of the factors affecting the recruitment and retention of women in academic chemistry (*Recruitment and Retention of Women in Academic Chemistry*, Royal Society of Chemistry, 2002). The outcomes of this report formed the basis of good practice guidelines for UK science departments that led to the development of the Athena Swan project. Trudy also undertook the first UK study on the cultural barriers to women in management (*The Key to the Men's Club, Opening the Doors to Women in Management*, The Institute of Management, 1992) which led to changes in thinking about the barriers to the progression of women to leadership positions. Trudy's early career was in policy work in the UK civil service, working in the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and then Department for Trade and Industry.



Ms. Sandra ROBERTSON

Chief Investment Officer and Chief Executive Officer, OUem, University of Oxford

Sandra is Chief Investment Officer, Chief Executive Officer and sits on the Board of OU Endowment Management (OUem). OUem manages £2.4bn of charitable endowments on behalf of 27 investors from the collegiate University of Oxford. As Chief Investment Officer, Sandra has discretion for all investment decisions. As Chief Executive Officer, she is responsible for overall strategy of the business and ensuring the success of the company.

Prior to joining OUem at its inception in September 2007, Sandra spent 14 years at the Wellcome Trust, most recently as Co-Head of Portfolio Management, sitting on its investment committee from 1997-2007. Sandra is a graduate of Napier College, Edinburgh (BA Hons), a Trustee of The Queen's Trust and a member of the TIFF Advisory Board in the US.



Ms. Antonia COAD

Head of Investor Relations and External Affairs, OUem, University of Oxford

Antonia is responsible for managing all aspects of reporting to OU Endowment Management's (OUem) 27 collegiate investors and the information available to their stakeholders. Antonia also ensures OUem has a consistent approach to its Governance Policy across the portfolio. This outlines how OUem incorporates a wide range of risks into all investment decisions, including environmental and social.

Antonia joined OUem in January 2014 having previously worked at financial communications agencies, including College Hill and Bell Pottinger, where she specifically focused on financial services businesses. She is a graduate of the University of Oxford (Worcester College).



Mr. Nick HILLMAN

Director of the Higher Education Policy Institute

Nick Hillman has been the Director of HEPI (Higher Education Policy Institute) since January 2014. He worked for the Rt Hon David Willetts MP, the Minister for Universities and Science, from 2007 until the end of 2013, as Chief of Staff and then Special Adviser in the Department for Business, Innovation and Skills. Previously, he was a History teacher and worked at the Association of British Insurers. At the 2010 general election, he was the runner-up in Cambridge.

He has written for a range of think tanks and journals. His recent writings include an article on the fifty-year history of student loans for Contemporary British History, a pamphlet on being a special adviser for the Institute of Government and a paper comparing access to selective secondary schools and selective universities for Higher Education Review.

His recent pamphlets for HEPI include an assessment of the impact of students in the general election of 2015, a comparison of the UK and German higher education systems and a guide to the removal of student numbers controls.
